

FOREWORD

The first effort to establish guidelines for swine improvement programs occurred when 25 individuals representing test station managers, supervisors and extension swine personnel met in Des Moines, Iowa, March 6, 1974. This group organized the National Association of Swine Testing Stations which had as its objective the standardization of test station programs. At its September 10th meeting held at Austin, Minnesota, the membership invitation was extended to include the National Pork Council, National Association of Swine Records and the Agricultural Press. Subcommittees dealing with testing procedures, data reporting, index standardization, ration and health standards, on-farm programs and education were appointed by President Delmar Gerdes.

To more appropriately describe the goals of the organization, the National Association of Swine Testing Stations was reorganized March 13, 1975 at Kansas City, Missouri, under the name of "National Swine Improvement Federation". The first landmark of foregoing years of work was achieved in November 1976 with the publishing of the "Guidelines for Uniform Swine Improvement Programs".

Since that historic point, five symposiums dealing with on-farm and central test programs have been held at St. Louis, Missouri. In 1981, through a joint effort between the National Swine Improvement Federation and the National Pork Producers' Council, a fifth conference was held in Des Moines, Iowa. Through invitation papers and committee meetings, NSIF developed the theme, "Application of Performance Records to Breeding Programs". This proceedings is a summary of the papers presented at the Symposium and Annual Meeting held November 29, 30 and December 1, 1981 at the Hyatt House, Des Moines, Iowa. The joint conference on "Essential Elements of Efficiency" was sponsored by NPPC and held on December 1 and 2, 1981.

The Symposium was organized to deal with selection schemes and application of performance testing in two basic on-farm and central testing programs. The basic trait committees discussed the problems of implementation and utilization of performance testing.

The Federation wishes to recognize Max Waldo, who served as program chairman, David Meisinger, NPPC, conference coordinator, National Pork Producers' Council, and Jo Ann Alumbaugh, National Association of Swine Records, for conference publicity.
